In the spring we partnered with the Rowan University Art Gallery to produce **cultivated space**, a show of diverse artistic interpretations of gardens and domesticated natural environments. Making use of the floor and the walls, the twelve artists used a wide range of media to plumb mythologies, cultural identities, and internal reflections. The resulting installation was breathtaking and immersive, pulling viewers into a unique environment

Nancy Agati received an Ecotopian Toolmaker Award for Delaware Watershed Justice from the Penn Program in Environmental Humanities. Her tool project *Basins and Borders* demonstrates the benefits of permeable surfaces in urban areas prone to flooding. Public workshops were conducted during the summer at the Independence Seaport Museum and at the Atlantic City Arts Foundation, NJ. Documentation of the 2022 Ecotopian Toolkit Project was on exhibit at ISM through December 2022, with a forthcoming catalog in 2023. Agati was pleased to have been awarded an Illuminate the Arts Grant from the City of Philadelphia's Office of Arts, Culture and the Creative Economy.

Suspended in Nature a two person show with artist Nicole Donnelly was on exhibit through the month of November at the Allens Lane Art Center, Philadelphia. Agati presented recent works on paper along with her *Monoliti* sculpture series, and a large tree sculpture entitled *Split*.

Agati is honored to have participated in the Souls Shot Portrait Project for 2022. Her portrait for the George family, who lost their son to gun violence, was on exhibit at the Presbyterian Church of Chestnut Hill in December. The exhibition will travel to various locations throughout 2023.

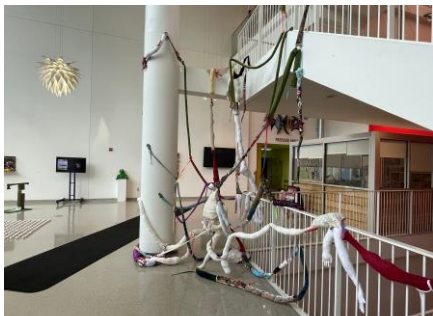

The Past Supporting the Future

How PS Member Chenlin Cai has transformed Chinatown's Skyline

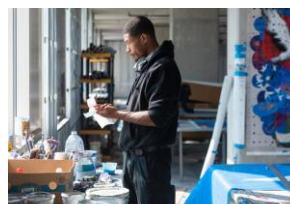
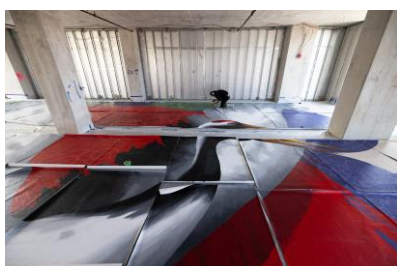


Chenlin Cai adds an enormous accomplishment to his already impressive resume. His mural *The Past Supporting the Future* is finished and now spreading its wings over Philadelphia's Chinatown. Designed by the artist team of Chenlin Cai, Eurhi Jones and Yvonne Lung, the 54 ft-tall crane, a symbol of longevity, is on the west wall of the 21-story Crane Community Center at 10th and Vine Streets. Amongst the many other images featured in the mural are a flock of paper cranes, a dragon boat team, a young girl performing the lion dance, a traditional Pipa stringed instrument, traditional lanterns which bring luck and protection, the Monkey King, a popular figure from Chinese opera, and a swallow, representing migration.

Peony petals compose the background as well as textile patterns from some of the many AAPI cultures living in Philadelphia: Japan, India, Korea, China, Vietnam, Indonesia, Thailand, Myanmar, Laos, Cambodia, Tibet, Bhutan, and the Philippines.

Three years of planning have brought *The Past Supporting the Future* to fruition. It, along with several interior murals, was commissioned by the Philadelphia Chinatown Development Corporation as part of the Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority's Percent for Art Program, in partnership with Mural Arts Philadelphia and the Philadelphia Housing Development Corporation (PHDC). Over 100 volunteers of all ages from the Chinatown community and other AAPI organizations, plus several Mural Arts Interns, began painting in the summer of 2022.

This remarkable artistic achievement would not have been realized without the community's efforts. Cai says of the mural, "the design is rich with symbolism, including real and paper cranes, that will speak to different segments of the Asian American community while also showcasing the friendship and unity between different Asian countries."

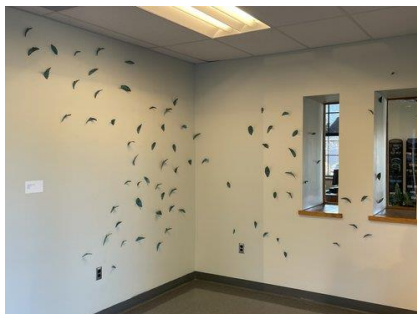

PS presented a vibrant exhibition of contemporary sculpture at the Kramer Hall Galleries in Hammonton, NJ. On view from October 20, 2022 – January 23, 2023, the exhibition made use of elements of light, movement, and layered forms to embrace the viewer in a meditative, almost other-worldly ambience.

The 25 artworks by 16 artists that were selected by jurors TK Smith and Brittany Webb reflected the artists' creative responses to the word "lilt."

The artists responding to the open call challenged us to approach the term in new ways, to expansively consider the ephemeral and immaterial, and the definition of sculpture".

TOOLS OF THE TRADE

PS member Virginia Maksymowicz's sculpture at William H. Gray III 30th Street Station

It's a good thing Virginia Maksymowicz liked to read the on-board magazine *The National* during her Amtrak commute to her teaching position at Franklin and Marshall College. Around 2016 she noticed the magazine started to write articles about artists such as Laurie Anderson and Judy Chicago. They also began to invite artists to submit designs of Amtrak's national route map in a unique way.

Other artists she knew had designed maps, so she submitted a proposal, and it was accepted. She had been making plaster casts of tools and bones for other sculptural work and, for the map, she decided to incorporate casts of the tools that Amtrak workers might use on the job. She collected vintage tools, made silicone molds, and cast the tools in white Hydrostone to suggest a skeletal structure in the final piece.

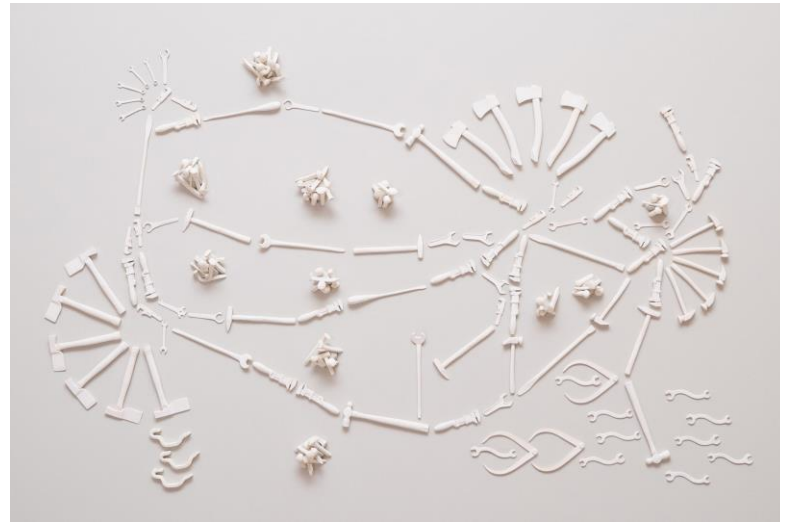

Although the map had been made to be photographed for the pages of the magazine, the cast tools were sculptural, and stored away in boxes. While she was stuck at home during the pandemic lockdown, she got in touch with Amtrak president Stephen Gardner and asked if he would like the 3-D version. He immediately said yes and passed it down the chain of command.

Its new home turned out to be in Philadelphia's 30th Street Station and was installed in April 2022. Because of space limitations *Tools of the Trade* is a little smaller than the map she made for the magazine spread. And since the station is both historic, and undergoing renovations, she wasn't allowed to attach anything to the walls. The compromise was a moveable wall that would fit into an existing alcove in the North Waiting Room, and be wheeled out for special events.

In her studio she glued the casts of the tools onto three 4' x 8' panels of sheetrock, except for the seams. Amtrak staff came to pick up the panels and bring them to the Station where the workers built the moveable wall, installed the panels, taped, and mudded the seams. When they finished she was called in to glue on the last few tool casts over the seams.

The map not only represents the many train routes but also, like a skeleton, the connections make separate and different parts into a working whole. And her collaboration with the company involved many entities that all functioned as a well-oiled machine. As she says, "Amtrak was a joy to work with. All the people involved, from the station manager to the head of facilities to the truck drivers to the police, were fabulous. They were incredibly unbureaucratic, a wonderful surprise in this day and age!"

A Tale of Two Murals

African American History/Black Lives Matter - originally at University City High School, half of it is now at Moore College of Art and Design

A long time ago I did a 7'h x 50'w ceramic mural commissioned under the auspices of the city's One Percent for Art Program, at the now defunct University City High School. I did it with the assistance of about 100 students and art teachers.

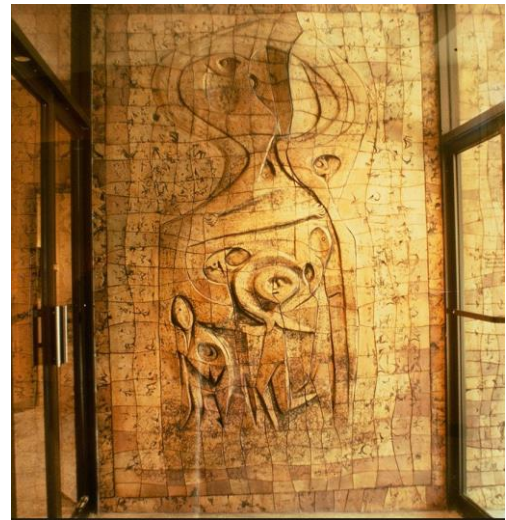
It was installed in the main open entryway for about 10 years. Every so often I would stop by to see it. On my last visit I saw that the school was locked and boarded up. I was concerned about the mural so I called the Board of Education and was told that the school would be demolished.

I called many offices at the Board of Education to save the mural. It's a long story, but we did. Half of the mural was reinstalled at Moore College of Art and Design, and hopefully the other half will be reinstalled at Albright College in Reading, PA.

But the story of my Shubert Theater ceramic mural does not have the same happy ending.

The mural measured 10'h x 8'w and was in the main entryway of the theater for about 20 years. I got a call on a Saturday from a well-known Philadelphia architect to inform me that renovations were to be done at the theater, and that the mural was "in the way" of his design and had to be taken down within a few days. I said that I didn't think it would be proper for him to do that because the mural was paid for by a state grant and the citizens of Pennsylvania. Pardon the expression, but the SOB said, no matter, take it down or the mural would be demolished

That Monday I made about 20 calls to various people, including a lawyer to get an injunction. Nothing. The architect dismantled the mural into blocks. While this was being done, because I could not afford the huge storage fees, I called several institutions who might be interested in the mural. One was in Chester County.

It was planned to have the mural shipped to the institution upon dismantling it, but when it arrived at the institution they said that they weren't ready for it and refused it. Whew!!!! It went into storage at the firm that dismantled it, without my knowledge or approval. Over the years it was in storage, while I was seeking a new home for the mural, I would periodically call to "check on it". On my last call they said that they dumped it into the Camden river because they couldn't locate me "What? You have my phone number and address!" It was a beautiful mural.

Fortunately, I have the original model of the mural and also gave a copy to the president of the music school that was affiliated with the Shubert. I would suggest artists get an experienced Lawyer for the Arts if a problem with their public work ever occurs.

HOLLOGRAMS/Satire for the Cynical

The Power of Art

It's embarrassing but I've finally found the perfect use for my senior thesis paintings and it's not hanging them on the wall. These 4' x 2' sheets of corrugated cardboard have inexplicably followed me through many years and many moves. But now 2 of them are blocking the top of my stairway to keep apart my warring cats.
